In the name of Jesus Christ, we welcome you to St. Mark's.

It is our hope and prayer that while you are here, you will be touched by the Spirit of the living Christ and fed by the grace of God.

We worship according to the rites of the Episcopal Church in the *Book of Common Prayer*. We experience the real presence of Christ in the bread and wine of Holy Communion, and we encourage all baptized persons who are seeking a deeper communion with our Lord and with one another to share in the mystical food of the Eucharistic feast. If you are not yet baptized or if for some other reason it is not appropriate for you to partake of Communion, please come forward for a blessing. The sacrament is distributed under the forms of both bread and wine. To receive the wine, you may drink from the common cup. We encourage baptized children to partake of Holy Communion because the sacrament is formative to all, regardless of one's ability to understand it.

We invite you to make St. Mark's your holy home, and hope you will join us as we seek a deeper life in Christ, a more holy communion with one another, and a greater love for the world. By the grace of God, we are engaged in a mutual ministry in which members give of their time, talent, and treasure for the love of Christ through our church.




The Epistle Titus 3:4-7

The Nicene Creed BCP 358

> We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. Through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven: by the power of the Holy Spirit he became incarnate from the Virgin Mary, and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father.

He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son. With the Father and the Son he is worshiped and glorified. He has spoken through the Prophets. We believe in one holy catholic and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. Amen.


It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.


The Christmas Blessing

Ned's Notes - Our Prelude Music: Michel Richard de Lalande was a French composer and organist of the Baroque era, in the favored service of Louis XIV. His Noëls en trio are settings of popular French Noëls (Christmas "carols," obviously, as we call them) that would have been familiar to the French faithful for centuries. While the melodies are not familiar to us (in the 21st century United States), we can still appreciate the beauty, charm, and gracefulness of these settings. Hodie Christus natus est is the Antiphon to a Magnificat sung at Christmas Day Vespers. This particular Gregorian chant was made known to a larger audience by Benjamin Britten in his popular Ceremony of Carols. Our Offertory Solo is a transcription of Byrd's lovely From Virgin's womb on this day, for voice and string "consort" (in this case, probably a quartet of viols), and during the Communion we'll hear another transcription, this of music of Gibbons: the principal melody is familiar to us as Hymn 328, 'Draw night and take the Body of the Lord.' As on the night before this blessed morn is the original text Gibbons had in mind for this melody. As for our Postlude, we'll hear the jolly final movement from the third of Handel's Trio Sonatas, delightful works not heard often enough. "HWV" refers to the catalogue number according to the "Händel-Werke-Verzeichnis" (Catalogue of Handel's Works).
