


## Genesis 45:3-11, 15

# The Second Reading

Someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be, but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body.


So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam,

became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. But it is not the spiritual that is first, but the physical, and then the spiritual. The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. As was the man of dust, so are those who are of the dust; and as is the man of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we will also bear the image of the man of heaven.

What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.

## The Nicene Creed



For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

**Ned's Notes:** We thank Dr. Michael Burnette for leading the music of our worship this morning. The composer of our **Offertory Anthem**, Arthur William Foote, was part of a group of distinguished late 19th/early 20th century American composers known as the "The Boston Six". Foote was one of the founders of the American Guild of Organists, which has since become the most important professional organization for church musicians, welcoming organists of all faiths and traditions. Our **Communion Anthem** is a well-known choral work of Mozart: his sublime *Ave verum corpus*, K 618, written in June of 1791, six months before his death at the age of thirty-five.

# Holy Land Reunion with Guide Iyad Qumri and Bishop Jeff Mello

**Thursday, March 6, 2025 from 6-8PM in Morrill Hall** Join us as we hear updates from Iyad Qumri and Bishop Jeff Mello on the status of pilgrimage to the Holy Land. Bishop Jeff and a group of other bishops have recently returned from a pilgrimage, so we will be interested to hear about their experience and learn about the good work being done by our brothers and sisters in Christ in the Diocese of Jerusalem.

Enjoy drinks as you mingle with fellow pilgrims, followed by a presentation from lyad and Bishop Jeff, moderated by Fr. Peter. A Mediterranean buffet supper will be served following the presentation.

Virtual Pilgrimage to Jerusalem March 7, 2025 from 10AM-4PM

**in the St. Mark's Library** (lunch included) Deepen your Lenten experience by participating in a virtual pilgrimage to Jerusalem. Led by Christian tour guide Canon Iyad Qumri from Jerusalem, this event will be hosted by St. Mark's. Your day will begin with a video welcome to Jerusalem from Archbishop Hosam Naoum, as he would if you were visiting the Cathedral Close in person. Another video will give you a tour of the entire Cathedral Close, including the guesthouse where you might stay on pilgrimage—a guestroom, the gardens, and the dining and meeting rooms. From there, you will tour the Old City of Jerusalem including the famous gates, the Cardo, the Western Wall, the Temple Mount, and the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. As you progress on this journey, you will be given time to pause, reflect, meditate, and pray as you walk in the footsteps of and learn more about the ministry of Jesus. Your day will conclude "walking" the Via Dolorosa, praying the Stations of the Cross.

This workshop is geared toward those who want to learn about pilgrimages to the Holy Land, as well as those who have been on pilgrimage but want a refresher and/or an opportunity to reunite with fellow pilgrims. It will be especially rewarding for anyone who would like to go on pilgrimage but cannot afford the time or expense of a full trip.

Check-in will begin at 9:30 AM, with the program starting at 10AM and ending at 4PM. Registration fee is \$25, which includes a Mediterranean lunch. All are welcome. **Scan the QR code to register.**

A Course in Christian Mysticism for Lent and Easter Following a well-attended first season, Mondays with Merton returns for Lent and Easter. Led by Fr.
